President's Message



First of all I would like to thank Renee Graves for her time and talent as our outgoing President. She was a ray of sunshine and will be greatly missed.

One of the few perks of being President is you get to express what is on your mind in each issue of Deer Tales. When I first came on the DLIA Board of Directors back in the early 90's I was full of optimism for the future of the Lake. The Deer Lake Conservancy was formed and started implementing major projects to improve water quality. The results were immediate. The Deer Lake Improvement Association worked with over three hundred individual property owners to plan, fund, and complete the under grounding of primary electrical power lines supplying properties on the Lake. This project literally saved thousands of trees around the lake. The DLIA and Conservancy worked together through the Courts to defeat a proposed Cement Plant on the north side of the lake. These are but a few of the many projects and policies implemented at the time.

As the water quality and clarity improved, land values also increased dramatically and in many cases forced third and fourth generational families off of the Lake. As these families departed the sense of community and the level of respect and consideration as to how individuals actions negatively affect their neighbors sadly began to suffer. What was once a beautiful Northern Wisconsin Lake is fast turning into Lake Minnetonka East. Contractors get the job by pushing beyond the limits of development rules and regulations. Homeowners cut trees instead of branches to provide an unobstructed view of their property from the Lake. Wake board boats operate in close proximity to shore looking for the calm water only to cause major issues with shoreline erosion. High powered PWC's operate far too fast and far too close to other water craft and swimmers. I recently spent an afternoon at the boat landing quietly observing folks putting in and removing water craft from the lake. When it came to removing or not removing plant debris from boats some of the worst offenders were Deer lake residents. If those of us who have property on the Lake are not willing to properly clean our boats at the landing when the law requires it, why would we expect others using the lake to be any more diligent. The reason we have Zebra Mussels is simple, someone was careless. If I sound pessimistic it is because I am. Deer Lake is suffering a death by a thousand cuts. I believe we can do better but I am not sure we have the collective will to be better.

As I like to remind folks. If you don't like what you hear, there is always room on the committee.

May you all have a safe and healthy winter. See you in the spring.

Enviromental Updates:

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Aquatic Invasive Species-

Check your equipment before storage

With open water season winding down, recreational water equipment is being removed from the water for the year. It is crucial everyone continues to take the proper steps to make sure all equipment is cleaned properly to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species. Zebra mussels in particular, are invasive organisms that have established in Deer Lake. Landowners continue to report finding zebra mussels covering the bottom of boats, motors, docks and along the shoreline. They can cut feet, clog and overheat boat motors, and outcompete our essential native fish and mussels. Depending on conditions, they may survive out of water from several days to several weeks.

The following steps should be made when taking equipment out of the water for winter storage:

- •Inspect and remove all plants, mud or other debris found on equipment that has been sitting in water: dock posts, wheels, boats, rafts, pontoons, kayaks, jet skis.
- •Drain all water if possible.
- •Spray all equipment (including live wells) with a pressure washer sprayer. This will help get unwanted invasive species that are hanging on tight or that you can't see.
- •Spray down your equipment with a bleach/water solution, including the inside of live wells. One tablespoon of bleach per gallon of water and let it air dry to help kill unseen hitchhikers.
- •Talk to your own service provider and neighbors about taking these steps.

Conservancy Updates:

Deer Lake owners continue to take action to reduce runoff to the lake and improve shoreline habitat. Native plantings are a great way to accomplish both. Arnie and Miriam Lagus continued a native planting along their entire shoreline on Hungerford Point Road this year, and Jeanne Johnson planted native plants in a large area near the water on Bayview Drive. Both worked with landscape designer Debbie Elmer to complete the plantings. Tom and Jo McBride (Hungerford Point) and Paul and Alison Knapp (Anderson Lane) are planning to complete native planting projects yet this year. Many thanks to these owners for their efforts to preserve Deer Lake! Native plantings, natural shorelines, and projects to reduce runoff are marked with heron markers all around the lake with over 50 markers distributed so far. 

Water Friendly Trees

If you have waterfront property, especially on a seepage lake, you might be looking for some trees that can tolerate shifting water levels. Below are ten trees for fluctuating water levels. Trees contribute a great deal to any home landscape: shade, structure, a canopy "ceiling," filter for clean water, carbon absorption, and wildlife habitat.

The following ten trees can handle the fluctuating water level conditions currently found along Wisconsin's lakes and most grow well in medium to wet, well-drained soils. If you're thinking about planting a tree or need to replace some that have been damaged by storms or fluctuating water levels, give one of these a try on your shoreline.

- Red Maple
- Tamarack
- Silver Maple
- Swamp White Oak
- Eastern Cottonwood
- River Birch
- Northern Red Oak
- White Pine
- Eastern Cottonwood
- Elderberry
- Pussy Willow

Deer Lake Tales - A Look Back at Deer Lake By Kris Rognes

In 1958, my parents, Ted and Ramona Lindbom, were invited by Guido and Helen Becker to spend a day at their family cabin on Deer Lake. (Their daughter, Joan Leedy lives there today). It was love of DL at first sight. They bought a lot on the north shore - the other end of Tipperary Road (140th today) - and built their dream cabin.

My mom, sisters; Karen, Karla, Katy and I spent the majority of the summers at The Lake, while my dad commuted to The Cities. Deer Lake had many activities then. Sailing was popular, with regular regattas, as was water skiing. There was a slalom course set up on the south side of the lake. Lots of canoers, including the kids from Camp Lawton, and of course, fishing. The Lagoon Restaurant was always a popular spot. You could tie your boat up to the dock and enjoy a burger, steak or walleye. When you finished, you could fill the boat with gas, since pumps were conveniently located on the dock. And if the lake wasn't enough, there was always cliff jumping in the Interstate Park, horseback riding and much more.

Today, my husband, Jeff, and I are the fortunate owners of the same family cabin and we love sharing it with our kids, grandkids, sisters and friends.






